### THINK YOU **SMELL GASP**

Natural gas has an unpleasant, rotten egg-like odor for easy detection and your safety.

If you think you smell gas, leave the area immediately, then call PGW at 215-235-1212.

Remember, if you think you smell gas:

- **NEVER** flip the light switch on
- **NEVER** use electrical devices.
- **NEVER** try to locate the source of the gas leak.
- **NEVER** try to shut off any natural gas valves or appliances.
- **NEVER** re-enter the building or return to the area until a qualified utility representative says it is safe to do so.



## Third-Party Notification Offers Added Protection

PGW Third-Party Notification allows a PGW customer to select a third party to be notified if they are in danger of losing service due to non-payment.

This free service does not require the third party to pay a customer's bill. It's just a way to receive a notice if the customer is at risk of service termination.

The notification service can be canceled at any time.

# Consumer Product Safety Commission & Gas Stoves

Consumer Product Safety Commissioner (CPSC) Richard L. Trumka Jr. recently made public comments about using the CPSC to potentially ban natural gas stoves. The CPSC regulates a variety of consumer products for safety and health risks.

The U.S. CPSC and EPA do not present gas ranges as a significant contributor to adverse air quality or health hazard in their technical or public information literature, guidance, or requirements. Also, per the White House (Jan. 2023), "The President does not support banning gas stoves - and the CPSC, which is independent, is not banning gas stoves."
